...and getting your vote tossed.

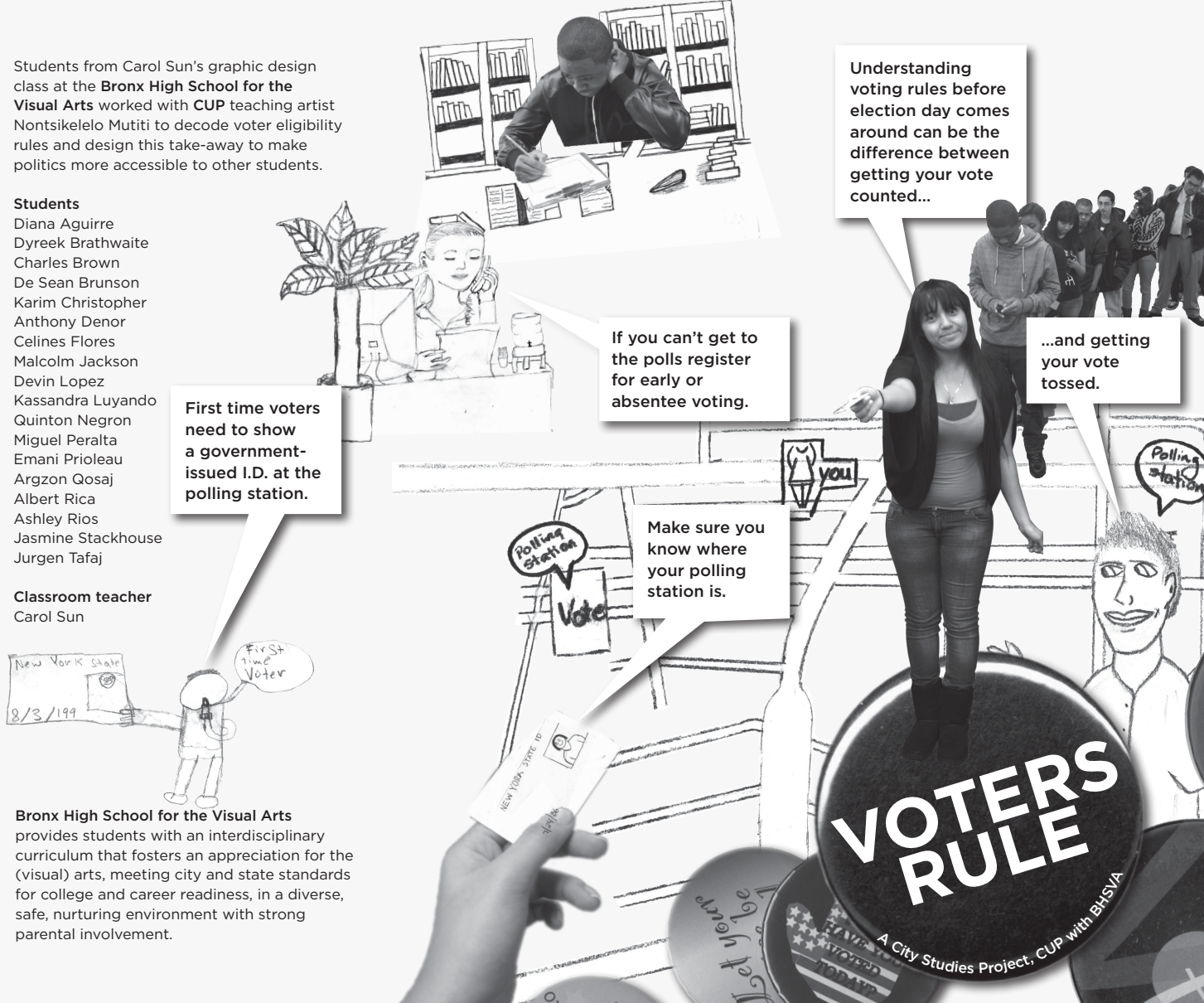

AND WHO'S BEING SHUT OUT OF THE PROCESS?

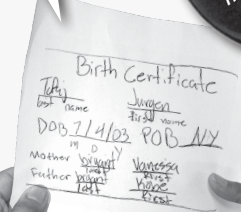
I must be at least 18 years old by election day.
